What is CLD?

CLD is a way of working with individuals, communities and organisations which help supports individuals and organisations to address issues of importance to them, and make positive changes in their lives, and in their communities through learning, and social development.

What is a CLD plan?

A CLD Plan is a programme to work collaboratively with our communities, and direct resources to support individuals and organisations to gain new skills and improve the quality of life for our communities.

Why do we have one?

East Dunbartonshire Council has a statutory duty (Community Learning & Development (Scotland) Regulations 2013) to produce a plan with partners every three years to "secure adequate and sufficient provision of Community Learning & Development (CLD) in our area". The plan should provide a clearly defined framework for coordinating, planning, and delivering CLD with partners who contribute to work supporting:

- improved life chances for people of all ages through learning, personal development and active citizenship
- stronger, more resilient, supportive, influential, and inclusive communities

Who are the CLD Strategic Partnership?

CLD is delivered by many partners within East Dunbartonshire, including East Dunbartonshire Council, East Dunbartonshire Citizen Advice Burea, (EDCAB), Health & Social Care Partnership, (HSCP), East Dunbartonshire Leisure and Culture Trust, (EDLCT), East Dunbartonshire Voluntary Action, (EDVA), New College Lanarkshire, Police Scotland, and Skills Development Scotland.

This partnership aims to bring together the right organisations to make a difference for individuals and communities in East Dunbartonshire through community learning and development (CLD). We will work together to achieve positive impacts additional to those achieved by individual partners.

Principles of CLD The Community Learning and Development


CLD approach is based on a commitment to the principles of:

- Empowerment Increasing the ability of individuals and groups to influence matters affecting them and their communities
- Participation Supporting people to take part in decision-making
- Inclusion, equality of opportunity and anti-discrimination Recognising some people need additional support to overcome the barriers they face

- Self-determination Supporting the right of people to make their own choices
- Partnership Ensuring resources, varied skills and capabilities are used effectively.

How will we ensure we deliver?

East Dunbartonshire Community Planning Partnership has six high-level outcomes which are delivered through the work of the Community Planning Executive Group, Strategic Partnerships, who are accountable to the Community Planning partnership Group and Strategic Board.

Our children and young people are safe, healthy and ready to learn.

Our people are equipped with knowledge and skills for learning, life and work.


Local Outcome 4

This plan has been approved by East Dunbartonshire Council and East Dunbartonshire Community Planning Partnership (CPP) Board. An annual report on progress made on the plan is submitted to the Council and CPP Board each year. The CLD Partnership will continue to monitor the progress in the implementation of the respective components of the plan.


The current remit of the CLD Partnership is as follows but will be reviewed annually and updated as required throughout the lifetime of this plan:

- To oversee compliance for the CLD (Scotland) Regulations 2013 through the development, implementation, monitoring, and evaluation of the four-year plan 2021 – 2025 and update it to reflect any changes as required
- To co-ordinate the strategic delivery of CLD provision at a local level in collaboration with the relevant strategic partnerships.
- To respond appropriately to feedback from inspections including CLD Education Scotland inspections as well as other organisations e.g. Children's Services Inspection, Best Value reports, etc
- To review the quality and effectiveness of CLD activity in line with the Education Scotland's self-evaluation framework 'How Good is the Learning and Development in Our Community?'
- Develop an effective workforce development plan for staff, partners, and volunteers to ensure they are upskilled to the level required and have the skills, confidence and training required to deliver provision to our local communities and respond to identified needs
- Coordinate the ongoing consultation and dialogue with our communities in respect of the CLD Partnership
- Respond to any requests for data in relation to CLD activity at National and Regional Levels e.g. CLDMS KPI's, COSLA, CLD Standards Council etc
- To ensure that leadership for CLD is effectively provided by East Dunbartonshire Council's Service Lead for Community Services and Service Lead for Education.

Adult learning and employability



Adult learning case study

Participant engaged with Parental Employment Support project in February 2024.


They were a parent of two children aged five and seven years of age. They had been out of employment due to child's disability, which resulted in hospitalisation. As there had been no hospitalisation for a year, the participant felt in better position to explore returning to work environment.

Through a person-centred action learning plan, the participant accessed a range of supports and courses which empowered the individual to succeed in gaining meaningful employment, and continue their learning journey, to enable their ultimate goal: to support families who have children with disabilities. The participant is being supported to access open university, enabling access to qualifications whilst support work-life-family balance.

Challenge Poverty Case Study

Client is a single parent with a child aged nine, who exhibits behaviours associated with autism and ADHD. They work full time and in receipt of Child Tax Credit and Child Benefit, with an annual income of approximate £23,000. Client came to outreach as they are struggling financially to cover all bills and expenses associated with caring for their child. Although yet to receive a formal diagnosis of autism, the parent has been paying for counselling support. Childcare costs of approx. £198 per month. They reside in a Housing Association property and pays monthly rent of £460.

CAB supported completion of a Child Disability Payment application, and also collated supporting letters. A benefit check was undertaken, and applied for Universal Credit, which supported award of housing benefit and childcare support, resulting in clients financial wellbeing improving by £573 per month. A successful award of child disability payment was also secured, they were awarded at Middle rate of £72.65 per week



CLD Gatherings

The Nova Scotia Folk Club is a grassroots, community-driven non-profit organisation that brings people together for live music and companionship every Wednesday. While the club primarily attracts those over 60, anyone aged 18 and over is welcome. With support from the CLD Partnership, including funding opportunities, the club plays a vital role in enhancing wellbeing and reducing isolation.
